Re: Meeting with First Nations Leaders 11 January 2013

This letter is further to our letter of 29 December 2012, a copy of which is attached for your reference (also found at http://www.lrwc.org/?p=5478). We were pleased to learn that you plan to meet with First Nations leaders on 11 January 2012. However, we are disappointed to learn that the Governor General reports he has no plans to attend this meeting.

There has been widespread expectation that the Governor General would attend a meeting to begin a discussion about the relationship between First Nations and Canada. He is the representative of the Queen in Canada and most of the treaties with the original nations were signed in the name of the Crown, not Canada. His presence is necessary if there is a true intention to "re-set" the relationship. We urge you to request that the Governor General attend the meeting on January 11 to demonstrate the federal government's sincere intention towards reconciliation with indigenous peoples in Canada.

We respectfully suggest that the blue print for reconciliation include a commitment to implement the recommendations of the 1996 Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples (RCAP). The RCAP Report affirms the necessity of recreating the treaty partnership with the starting point being recognition of indigenous nationhood. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), endorsed by Canada in November 2010, includes a declaration that

Article 19

"States shall consult and cooperate in good faith with the indigenous peoples concerned...in order to obtain their <u>free</u>, <u>prior and informed consent</u> before adopting and implementing legislative or administrative measures that may affect them." [emphasis added]

As stated by United Nations Special Rapporteur James Anaya, "[d]ialogue between the Government [of Canada] and First Nations should proceed in accordance with the standards expressed in the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."

The duty to consult on all matters affecting indigenous peoples also arises from the right of peoples to self-determination under common Article 1 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) and the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR) which are binding on Canada at international law. In addition, the right to free, prior and informed consultation has now emerged as a general principle of international law. The declared right of indigenous peoples to be consulted on all legislation and administrative actions that may affect them must not be ignored. We respectfully urge your government to adopt RCAP's approach and UNDRIP standards as a template for actions towards reconciliation.

Good faith attempts at reconciliation must be demonstrated at the January 11, 2013 meeting. The Governor General's presence at the meeting has been specifically requested and will serve as an indication of respect for the importance of the nation to nation issues to be discussed. Given the nature of early treaty relations, the exclusion of the First Nations from the procedures that led to Canada's emergence as an independent state and Canada's on-going relationship with the Crown the presence of the monarch's representative is appropriate. It would recognize the need to reconsider and correct historic wrongs in order to develop respectful modern relations.
