

Assessing the National Security Law in Hong Kong: The First 365 Days

Thursday 1 July 2021 0730-0900 EDT/1330-1500 CEST/1930-2100 HKST

On 30 June 2020, Beijing imposed the National Security Law (NSL) on Hong Kong. PRC and Hong Kong authorities have wielded this legislation to silence dissent, arrest individuals for expressing pro-democratic views, stifle protests, and reduce the autonomy of Hong Kong's judiciary and legislature. This 90-minute event will bring together Hong Kong activists in exile and human rights experts to discuss the practical effects of the NSL on Hong Kong's legal system and democratic processes, and on Hong Kong residents.
